History and Political Change

- Colonial rule upset traditional forms of government and natural boundaries, causing problems for modern countries in Western and Central Africa.
- Ethnic violence, corrupt officials, and military rule have made it hard for many countries to establish stable, democratic governments.



Economies and Cultures

- Most people in Western and Central Africa are subsistence farmers, but cash crops and minerals are also important in the economy.
- The extended family is the basis of society in Africa south of the Sahara.

- Nigeria has a large population, valuable resources, and a rich cultural history, but it has faced problems since gaining independence.
- The Hausa, Yoruba, and Igbo are the largest of Nigeria's more than 250 ethnic groups.
