Interdisciplinary Activity: Language Arts

Writing a Newspaper Report

Research the assassination of Julius Caesar by a group of Roman senators in 44 B.C. Write a front-page news article about the event. Include a headline and answers to the *who*, *what*, *where*, and *when* questions of good reporting.

Cooperative Learning Activity

Creating a Playbill With a group of two or three students, design and create a playbill, or program for the audience, for a Greek tragedy. Assign responsibilities for the playbill.
